The Fall 2021 semester at Purdue was characterized as (what seemed to be) the wake of the pandemic. The tight restrictions and heavy regulations of the previous year were eased which allowed for all lectures to be in-person and events such as Boilermaker Football and Basketball. As the campus opens up, the Lambda Iota chapter continues to demonstrate success in every facet of life at Purdue.

The chapter remains in good standing with Purdue and the Interfraternity Council while being an example of excellence for other fraternities. We have a total of 116 active brothers and 31 of those are new members; 50 brothers currently live in the house. The chapter has once again begun to operate more "normally" with the decrease in COVID restrictions, allowing for many traditions to be brought back such as weekly family-style dinners. Family-style dinners have promoted brotherhood and a stronger bond between the pledge classes living in the house. In addition, the chapter was also able to host our annual Black Diamond Formal at the

beautiful Fowler Mansion in downtown Lafayette during early December.

The cabinet and chapter appreciates the continued support from Purple Legionnaire Bill Miller, the House Corporation including President Chris Burke, and graduate brothers Tim Sarhage, Aj DiCarlo, and Sam DiCarlo among others. The support and knowledge of these graduate brothers allows for the continuation of traditions and other events at a high level.

The weekend before the Spring 2022 semester began, cabinet attended the Fiji Academy in St. Louis. At this three day event, we learned how to be a courageous leader and the great things that many other chapters are doing across the country. Liam Bettez (2021) was awarded the Wilkinson award and spoke about how the cabinet must go beyond just "checking the boxes" of our positions. The new cabinet looks forward to the Spring 2022 semester and to follow Liam's advice with the goal of winning a national award for 2022.

Philanthropy

This past fall semester, the brothers of the Lambda Iota chapter demonstrated remarkable initiative towards improving the community; collectively raising over \$7,300. Pulling inspiration from one of the five core values of Phi Gamma Delta, brothers took it upon themselves to serve the Purdue and West Lafayette communities. On October 29th, the brothers hosted Lambda Iota's first ever 'Trunk or Treat' philanthropy event in the chapter parking lot. Brothers sold tickets to the event to fellow Purdue students who were able to 'Trunk or Treat' for candy and other treats out of the trunks of brothers' cars lined in the lot all while showing off their best Halloween costumes. Even though COVID regulations posed an obstacle, the brothers of the Lambda Iota chapter still were able to raise \$685, all of which was donated to the Lyn Treece Boys and Girls Club of Tippecanoe County. In October, Brothers also entered Phi Mu's Miracle Mania and performed a choreographed dance with sisters of Zeta Tau Alpha to raise money for Children's Miracle Network Hospitals. In November, Will Crawford (2024) led Fiji's fundraising efforts in the Purdue Dance Marathon and raised over \$3,000 for Riley Hospital for Children. Michael Uhrig (2024) has raised over \$3,600 for breast cancer awareness and research as a part of Zeta Tau Alpha's year-long Big Man on Campus competition.

Looking forward to the spring semester, philanthropy co-chairs Lindy Parr (2023) and Matt Bigelow (2023) have begun planning the annual "FIJI Putt-Putt" event, where brothers turn their rooms into mini-golf holes and tickets are sold to play holes throughout the house. Ticket revenue will be donated to a local charity which is to be determined.
