#### From the Cabinet

Lambda Iota is excited to announce a partnership with Ambition in Motion, a mentorship program designed to connect current Lambda Iota undergraduates and Graduate Brothers of Lambda Iota. Purple Legionnaire, Bill Miller, the Cabinet, and Graduate Relations Chairmen have worked with the founder of Ambition in Motion to create a program where Purdue Fijis can benefit from the life and workplace experience of Lambda Iota graduates. We have attained permission from Phi Gamma Delta International Headquarters to use the working email contact list of Lambda Iota graduates to seek interest in becoming a mentor to at least one current brother or incoming pledge at Lambda Iota. We hope that this partnership will allow you to pay share your life experience from your time after Lambda Iota. We also seek the opportunity to gain insight and advice for success during and after college. At 640 Russell, we truly are embracing the saying, "Not for college days alone" and hope you would consider becoming a mentor this fall semester.

#### Here's how it will work:

Garrett Mintz, founder of Ambition in Motion, will reach out to the email list of Lambda Iota Graduate and Undergraduate Brothers to seek their interest and commitment to participate in a mentor/mentee partnership.

Once a commitment to participate has been made, a website link to a survey will be sent to both parties to determine various career paths and other likeness questions, to best pair graduates and undergraduates with similar interests and goals.

Once the results from the surveys are collected, Garrett and the cabinet will work to establish the mentee/mentor relationship pairing, and provide the undergraduates with the contact information to reach out their mentors and introduce themselves.

Throughout the semester, a schedule between the mentor and mentee will be created to have 4 workshops, or phone calls to discuss anything form old times and current times at 640 Russell, to what success looks like in the business world.

After the semester is over, a survey will be sent out to determine feedback, and interest in a continuing partnership with Ambition in Motion. We are engaging in a one semester trial program with this company, and if we feel the program can continue to help us connect with graduates, we will consider continuing the program.

#### Scholarship

The chapter continues to take pride in its scholarship as it is the paramount value. IFC Grade Point Average rankings for the spring semester have not yet been released, but expect to rank in the top 5 among houses with 100 or more members. However, the chapter feels good about our standing as we have, once again, posted a GPA above 3.0, with a cumulative of 3.16. Over half of the chapter reported GPA's over 3.0, with 9 brothers achieving 4.0 GPA's. ### ♦ Philanthropy and Community Service

Brothers remained dedicated to their pledge to increase philanthropic efforts on and off campus during the spring term. Brothers Aidan Hannon and Shota Tsuda ('20), led the undergraduate brothers in re-establishing an old philanthropy event called "Sandy Slam" for Testicular Cancer Research. The philanthropy was co-hosted with Alpha Gamma Rho. The event consisted of a co-ed volleyball tournament that Purdue fraternities and sororities were invited to participate. Everybody enjoyed the late semester afternoon, which was set with great weather and our old pal Andrew Lapel ('20) slapping together some fine burgers for all to enjoy. What's better than that? The event helped the chapter raise funds to put toward our house philanthropy efforts.
